- Held annually on August 31st.
- Organized by the Pennington Institute, a non-profit health advocacy group.
- An estimated 61 million people used opioids globaly in 2020, double that of 2010.

Goals

- Raise worldwide awareness about overdose risks.
- Provide accurate information on available support services.
- Promote evidence-based prevention and harm reduction strategies.
